The Rebellion Before Creation

My position is straightforward. The rebellion in heaven did not occur after creation. It preceded it. Creation was not the stage where rebellion happened. Creation was God's response to a rebellion that had already fractured His first family. This idea first took shape for me through the teaching of Donald Grey Barnhouse, the Philadelphia minister who argued that something catastrophic occurred before Genesis 1:1. Barnhouse did not go as far as I do, but he opened the door. The biblical text leaves room, and logic supports, that the fall of the supernatural beings happened before the material universe was formed.

Scripture never states that angels were created during the six days. Scripture never states that the rebellion happened during those days. Scripture never states that the rebellion happened immediately after. These are assumptions. What Scripture does show is that the serpent is already fallen by the time Adam and Eve appear in the garden. Genesis 3 introduces a tempter who is already in opposition to God. Second Peter 2:4 speaks of angels who sinned, and Jude 6 speaks of angels who abandoned their proper domain. These references point to a rebellion that predates human history. The conflict is already underway before humanity enters the story.

It is not reasonable to imagine that God, eternal and all knowing, created a perfect supernatural family and within moments they became jealous, conspired, and rebelled. Rebellion is not instant. Pride, ambition, resentment, and hierarchy take time to form. The idea that God created beings who immediately turned on Him is not coherent. The more reasonable conclusion is that the rebellion was already underway, and creation was God's next move in response to it.

God's Purpose: A Family

The Bible is clear about God's intention. He wants a family. Second Corinthians 6:18 says, "I will be a Father to you, and you shall be My sons and daughters." First John 3:1 says, "See what love the Father has given us, that we should be called children of God." Hebrews 2:10 says that God is "bringing many sons to glory." This is not metaphor. It is identity.

Before the rebellion, God already had a family, a supernatural one, and that family possessed volition. They could choose. Some chose against Him. The rebellion fractured that household. Creation becomes the beginning of a new family line. Humanity begins not as fully formed supernatural beings but as babies who grow, learn, trust, and respond to love. Jesus made it clear that God delights in children. Matthew 19:14 says, "Let the little children come to Me." Matthew 18:3 says, "Unless you become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." Every human being, except Adam and Eve, enters the world as a child. This is not a flaw in the design. It is the design.

Our Future Form

Scripture never states that our resurrected bodies will appear as mature adults. That assumption comes from tradition, not revelation. Scripture does say we will be like the angels in Luke 20:36. Scripture says we will be conformed to the image of Christ in Romans 8:29. Scripture says we will be children of God in First John 3:2. But nothing requires that our eternal form must resemble a thirty-year-old human body. Childlikeness, purity, innocence, and trust are central to Jesus' teaching. The kingdom belongs to such as these. Could our eternal form reflect that childlike identity. Scripture does not forbid it. Scripture does not define it. Scripture simply calls us children.

Summary

Two conclusions follow. The rebellion occurred before creation, and creation was God's response to a fractured supernatural family. Our eternal identity as children of God may be reflected not only spiritually but possibly in our resurrected form, since Scripture never mandates an adult appearance. This framework does not contradict Scripture. It fills in the silence with logic, purpose, and the character of God as revealed in the text.

This paper is the backbone beneath *The Eastminster Scroll*. Not the story. Not the narrative. Not the old man's voice. But the structure that makes the story possible - the prophetic architecture that explains why so few will be saved, and why the warnings in the Scroll carry the weight they do.

The book itself is not primarily about prophecy. It is about people - their blindness, their assumptions, their drift, and the quiet reasons why multitudes who believe they are safe will discover they never were. Prophecy enters the picture only because it exposes the framework behind that reality. It reveals the long decline, the thinning of faith, the rise of deception, and the supernatural forces shaping the final hour.

This document lays out that framework plainly. It shows how Daniel, Jesus, Paul, and John speak with one voice when the reader stops forcing their words into modern systems. It shows how the prophetic durations converge on a single year - 688 AD - and how the abomination of desolation is not a future temple scene but a structure that has stood for more than thirteen centuries. It shows how the restrainer is not a sudden removal of the Spirit but the slow erosion of true faith within the visible church. And it shows how the great apostasy is not future - it is present, mature, and nearly complete.

This framework is not speculation. It is not novelty. It is not the old man's imagination. It is the architecture Scripture itself builds when the reader approaches it slowly, honestly, and without protecting inherited assumptions.

“Let the reader understand.”

SECTION I - INTRODUCTION

The Need for a Prophetic Framework

If a man wants to understand the warnings in *The Eastminster Scroll*, he must first understand the structure beneath them. Prophecy has never been simple. God did not hand it to us in plain speech, the way a man might leave instructions on a kitchen table. He wrapped it in layers. He hid it behind symbols. He scattered it across centuries. And He did it for a reason.

The prophets themselves did not fully understand what they wrote. Peter told us plainly that they searched and wrestled with their own words, trying to grasp the timing and meaning of what the Spirit had shown them. If they struggled, then we should not pretend we can walk in with a casual reading and claim we understand what they could not.

Prophecy demands a framework. Without one, a man grabs at verses like loose threads and never sees the fabric they belong to. He becomes easy prey for any system that sounds confident. And history is full of such systems - bold, popular, and wrong.

The modern church inherited one of those systems. Not from Scripture. Not from the Reformers. But from the nineteenth century - a time when new ideas spread quickly and were accepted too easily. Dispensationalism rose in that moment. It was repeated so often, printed in so many study Bibles, taught in so many seminaries, and preached in so many pulpits that most Christians today think it is the Bible.

But it isn't. It's a lens. A filter. A framework built by men, not by Scripture.

And the cost of trusting the wrong framework is high. If a man is trained to look in the wrong direction, he will not recognize the real fulfillments when they appear. He will wait for events Scripture never promised. He will ignore the ones Scripture already fulfilled. And when clarity is needed most, he will be blind.

This paper lays out the framework that actually fits the text. It does not try to cover everything - no single paper could. But it does show how the pieces fit together: Daniel's timelines, Jesus' warnings, Paul's explanation, and John's visions. These are not scattered predictions. They form one story. One structure. One unfolding plan that stretches across empires, church history, apostasy, and the final revealing of God's justice.

My aim is simple: To walk the reader through that structure slowly, plainly, and faithfully - the way prophecy itself demands.

SECTION I - Ends.

A NOTE OF EXPLANATION - ANALOGY OF THE MAZE

Before a man can understand the Maze, he must understand why it exists. The Maze was not built for us first. It was built for the rulers of darkness who opposed the plan of God. They walked it long before we did. They saw the prophecies. They heard the warnings. They watched the movements of history. But they could not see the end. They could not see the narrow way. They could not see the hidden turn that would undo them.

Paul said that if the rulers of this age had understood the wisdom of God, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. They believed they were winning. They believed they were closing the door on God's plan. They believed they were destroying the threat. But they were walking into a dead end. The Maze was already in place, and they could not see it.

God concealed the meaning of prophecy so they would walk confidently into their own defeat. He hid the timing. He hid the purpose. He hid the path that led to the cross. He hid the narrow way in plain sight. And the powers of darkness, with all their intelligence, supernatural intelligence! and all their influence, could not find it.

The same concealment continues now. The Maze still stands. The powers of darkness still walk it. They widen the wrong paths. They decorate them. They fill them with false prophecy, false hope, false comfort, false systems, and false teachers. But they still cannot see the end. They still cannot find the narrow way. They still cannot escape the dead ends God built for them.

They must retreat. They must backtrack. They must rebuild their deceptions. They must try again. But a man does not need to retrace his steps. True repentance moves him instantly. The moment he yields, the wide path ends beneath his feet and the narrow path begins.

The Maze is their prison. It is our test. And it is God's design for both.

SECTION II - THE MAZE ANALOGY

Prophetic Concealment as Divine Design

If a man wants to understand prophecy, he must first understand how God built it. Scripture does not hide this. It shows it plainly, but only to the one who slows down long enough to see it.

Prophecy is not a straight road. It is a maze. Not the kind a child draws on paper, but the kind a master builder designs - with intention, with purpose, with walls that look right until the moment they don't.

A maze is built with many paths. Most of them feel like they could be the right one. They run straight for a while. They give the traveler confidence. They seem to lead somewhere. But they end in a wall. And when a man has walked far enough down a wrong path, pride makes it hard for him to turn back. It is easier to pretend the wall is the destination than to admit he took the wrong turn.

Prophecy works the same way. God did not hide truth because He delights in confusion. He hid it because the hiding serves a purpose. It separates the ones who seek Him from the ones who only seek answers. It separates the obedient from the curious. It separates the wise from the wicked.

Jesus said it Himself. When His disciples asked why He spoke in parables, He told them plainly:

“Because it is given unto you to know the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven, but to them it is not given.”

The mysteries are not for everyone. They are for the ones who walk with Him. The ones who fear Him. The ones who will not twist His words to fit their own desires.

The walls of the prophetic maze are built from familiar materials - verses pulled out of place, traditions handed down without question, systems that look neat on paper but rest on assumptions never proven.

A man raised on a futurist, literalist reading of Daniel will find many verses that seem to support it. The path will feel marked. It will feel safe. It will feel obvious. But it leads to a wall.

The true path is narrow. It begins with the prophets. It runs through Daniel’s timelines. It passes through the words of Jesus in Matthew 24. It continues through Paul’s warnings in 2 Thessalonians. And it reaches its full height in the Revelation given to John.

It is one thread. But it must be followed slowly. Patiently. Without forcing anything.

At every turn, another path will present itself - wider, easier, more familiar, more comfortable, more in line with what the man already believes. But the wider path is not the right one. It never has been.

Daniel was told the words were sealed until the time of the end. Not sealed forever. Sealed until the right season. Sealed until the ones who fear God would be ready to receive them.

And the angel told him something else - something most people skip over:

“None of the wicked shall understand; but the wise shall understand.”

This is not about intelligence. It is about allegiance.

The wicked - the ones whose hearts are not aligned with God - will never understand prophecy. They can memorize it. They can teach it. They can write books about it. But they will not understand it.

The wise - the ones who fear God, who obey Him, who seek Him - will understand.

Prophetic understanding is not a matter of cleverness. It is a matter of consecration.

The maze opens only to those who walk in the fear of the Lord.

SECTION III - THE LIFTING OF RESTRAINT

What Holds Back the Man of Sin

There is a passage in Paul's second letter to the Thessalonians that has troubled the church for centuries. Not because it is unclear, but because Paul left out the one detail everyone wishes he had written down. He spoke of a force, a "he" that holds back the full revealing of the man of sin. And he told the Thessalonians they already knew what he meant, because he had taught them in person. But he did not repeat that teaching in the letter. He left it unsaid. And that silence has opened the door to every kind of guesswork.

Paul wrote:

"And now ye know what withholdeth that he might be revealed in his time... only he who now letteth will let, until he be taken out of the way."

The modern church has filled that silence with its own assumptions. The most common one is that the restrainer is the Holy Spirit removed at a pretribulation rapture. It sounds neat. It fits their system. But the text does not say anything about a rapture. It only says something is "taken out of the way," meaning the obstruction is removed. Not that the Spirit leaves the earth. Scripture never teaches that the Spirit abandons the world before the end. He is present everywhere. Always has been. Always will be.

Others - many of the early church fathers - said the restrainer was the Roman Empire. And in their day, that made sense. Rome did hold back chaos. But Rome fell long ago. If Rome was the restrainer, then the man of sin should have appeared in full power in late antiquity. That did not happen. So that view collapses under its own weight.

The only interpretation that fits both Scripture and history is the simplest one:

The restrainer is the preserving, sanctifying influence of the Holy Spirit working through the true church.

Not the visible church. Not the institutions. Not the denominations. The true church - the ones who actually walk with God.

As long as genuine faith is present in the world, it pushes back against corruption. It slows decay. It preserves what is good. Jesus called His people salt. Salt keeps things from rotting. But He also warned that salt can lose its savor. And when it does, it is useless. It is still there physically, but it no longer does what it was meant to do.

That is how the restraint lifts. Not suddenly. Not in a moment. But slowly. Generation by generation, as real faith becomes rare.

Jesus asked, “When the Son of Man comes, will He find faith on the earth?” He was not wondering. He was pointing to the trajectory. Faith would thin out. The church would drift. The world would grow darker. And as the light dims, the man of sin gains room to rise.

This did not start last week. It did not start last century. It began when the Enlightenment pushed Scripture aside and enthroned human reason. It accelerated when industrialization uprooted communities and replaced the rhythms of faith with the rhythms of production. It has continued through every cultural shift that pushed God further out of public life.

The restraint has not been removed all at once. It has been eroding for three hundred years. And in our generation, the erosion is no longer slow. It is rapid. Visible. Undeniable.

The man of sin rises as the church loses its savor. That is the pattern. That is the warning.

And here the reader must understand something the modern systems never consider:

The man of sin cannot be a mere man. If he were, Satan would kill him long before the appointed hour. Satan has killed prophets, kings, apostles, and saints. A mortal is no threat to him. A mortal can be stopped. A mortal can be silenced.

But the final deceiver is not mortal. He is a supernatural being - one Satan cannot kill, one he will not oppose, one whose rise serves his purpose.

And mark this well:

Satan will work with this deceiver, not against him, because their aims run in the same direction - to mislead, to counterfeit, to imitate salvation with a lie clothed in glory, and to drag as many souls as possible into ruin before the true Christ appears.

This is the environment in which the man of sin rises: a world where faith has thinned, where truth has been traded for tradition, and where the visible church has lost its savor.

SECTION IV - THE RISE OF FALSE ESCHATOLOGY

How the Maze Misleads the Church

If a man wants to understand why the church is confused about prophecy, he must look at the systems it inherited. Not the Scriptures - the systems. Because most believers today do not read prophecy with fresh eyes. They read it through a lens handed to them long before they ever opened their Bibles.

The modern system - the one most Christians assume is simply “what the Bible teaches” - is dispensational premillennialism. It teaches a pretribulation rapture, a future rebuilt temple, a future Antichrist standing in that temple, and a seven-year tribulation built around a peace treaty with modern Israel. It presents all of this as the plain reading of Scripture.

But it is not the plain reading. It is a system built in the 1800s. It spread through the Scofield Reference Bible. It became tradition through repetition. And now most believers don't even know where it came from.

The problem is not that the system is popular. The problem is that it is wrong.

And when a wrong system becomes the default, it blinds the people who trust it.

If a man is trained to expect a future temple, he will not recognize the real abomination when it stands in front of him. If he is taught that the Antichrist must be a political figure from outside the church, he will not see the spiritual corruption rising inside the church. If he is told the prophetic clock has not started yet, he will not understand the fulfillments that have already happened.

A false framework does not just misinterpret the past. It disables the present. It blinds the future.

And when prophecy becomes a business, conferences, books, newsletters, excitement - the system becomes self-protecting. There is money in novelty. There is money in predictions. There is money in keeping people waiting for the next big thing.

But there is no money in telling people the apostasy is already here. There is no market for saying the man of sin rises from within the church. There is no applause for pointing out that the abomination has already been set up.

So the false system stays in place. Not because it is strong. But because it is profitable.

The maze misleads because the walls are familiar. They are built from verses people know. They are built from sermons they trust. They are built from charts they have seen since childhood.

But familiarity does not make a thing true. And repetition does not make a thing biblical.

The only way out of the maze is to lay down the system and return to the Scriptures themselves - slowly, honestly, without forcing anything, without protecting anything, without assuming anything.

When a man does that, the path becomes clear. It becomes narrow not wide. And the framework God intended begins to appear.

SECTION V - THE CONVERGENCE OF PROPHETIC DURATIONS AT 688 AD

Where Daniel's Numbers Land on Real Ground

If a man wants to understand the heart of Daniel's prophecy, he must understand one thing above all others: God tied the entire structure to real history. Not imagination. Not speculation. Not charts. Real years. Real events. Real ground. And when the numbers land on the ground, the wise stop and look.

Jesus told us plainly:

“When you see the abomination of desolation, spoken of by Daniel the prophet, standing in the holy place - let the reader understand.”

He did not say it as a suggestion. He said it as a command. Understand this.

Daniel spoke of the same thing, but from his side of history. Jesus spoke from His. Their words match. They do not compete. They do not contradict. They lock together like two sides of the same key.

Here is how their language aligns:

- Jesus — “Abomination of Desolation”
- Daniel — “Abomination that Desolates”
- Jesus — “Standing in”
- Daniel — “Set up”
- Jesus — “The holy place”
- Daniel — “The site of the daily sacrifice”

These are not poetic differences. These are exact parallels. They tell us what to look for and where to look for it.

And Daniel gives us the equation that unlocks the entire structure:

Take Away + 1290 = Set Up

If we can identify the moment the continual sacrifices were taken away, the rest of the timeline unfolds on its own. The math is simple. The meaning is not.

Part One: When Were the Daily Sacrifices Taken Away?

Most people assume the sacrifices ended when the Temple fell in 587 BC. But Scripture says otherwise.

Jeremiah 41:5 tells us that eighty men came with offerings after the Temple was already destroyed. They still brought grain offerings. They still brought incense. The altar still stood. The fire still burned. Worship continued in the ruins.

Why Daniel and Jesus Would Know

Daniel would have known the true end of the sacrifices because he was not a distant observer. He was a ruler in Babylon and Persia, a man with access to records, reports, and the affairs of the exiles. He would have known that worship continued after the Temple's destruction, that the altar still stood, and that the final offerings continued until the last deportation in 583 BC. He wrote with the knowledge of a man who lived inside the machinery of an empire.

Jesus would have known it for a far greater reason. He is not merely a witness to Israel's history. He is God. The sacrifices were offered to Him. He is the One who commanded them. He is the One who received them. He is the Lord of the covenant who watched the devotion of the men who continued those offerings in the ruins. When He spoke of Daniel's prophecy, He spoke with the authority of the One who knew every sacrifice ever made in His name.

This is why both Daniel and Jesus anchor the prophecy to the real moment the sacrifices ended. Not 587 BC, when the Temple fell, but 583 BC, when the final remnant was taken and the offerings ceased. They would have known the difference. And they built the prophecy around the truth, not the assumption.

So, the sacrifices did not end in 587 BC. They ended in **583 BC**, when the final deportation occurred - twenty-three years after the first captivity in 606 BC.

That is the "take away."

Daniel 12:11:

"From the time the continual sacrifice shall be taken away... there shall be 1290 days." HMT

The Meaning of "Continual"

The Hebrew Masoretic Text uses a word that most translations soften or obscure. Daniel does not simply say "the sacrifice." He uses the word *tamid* - "the continual." This matters. A continual offering cannot have multiple endings. It has one beginning and one final cessation.

Once something begins and continues continually, it can only stop once.

This is why the HMT is essential for understanding Daniel's timeline. It preserves the force of the word. It shows that Daniel is not referring to the destruction of the Temple in 587 BC, because the continual offerings did not end there. Jeremiah 41:5 records men still bringing grain offerings and incense after the Temple was already destroyed. The altar still stood. The fire still burned. Worship continued.

The continual offering ended only once - in 583 BC, when the final remnant was taken and the last worshipers were removed from the land. That is the moment Daniel anchors his prophecy to.

And Jesus, who is God and the One to whom those sacrifices were offered, would have known the exact year they ceased.

This is why both Daniel and Jesus point to the same reality. The continual offering ended in 583 BC. The prophetic clock begins there. And the numbers land exactly where God intended them to land. God exists in and beyond time, and He ordained the prophetic durations so they would converge precisely on 688 AD.

Part Two: Converting Prophetic Days to Solar Years

Daniel's prophetic timelines are measured in Hebrew prophetic years (360-day years), while modern historical records use solar years (365.24 days). For accuracy, prophetic years must be converted into solar years when aligning Daniel's numbers with recorded history.

To align them, we convert:

$$360 \div 365.24 = 0.9856$$

One Hebrew day equals **0.9856** solar days.

Now apply that to Daniel's number:

$$1290 \text{ Hebrew days} \times 0.9856 = 1271.42 \text{ solar years (decimals not needed) Rounded: } 1271 \text{ years}$$

Start at **583 BC**. Add **1271 years**.

Remember: There is no year zero. 1 BC goes straight to 1 AD.

So:

$$583 \text{ BC} + 1271 = 688 \text{ AD}$$

The numbers land exactly where history lands.

This is not guesswork. This is not stretching the text. This is the timeline Daniel gave, converted correctly, landing on a real event in a real year. But there is more...

Daniel's 1,335 Days and the Turning Point of 732 AD

Daniel gives a final prophetic duration: **1,335 days**. Interpreted prophetically as years, this number extends beyond the 1,290 and marks a point of blessing for those who endure to its completion.

Converting biblical Hebrew 360-day prophetic year to solar years:

Thus, **1,335 prophetic years = 1,315.75 solar years.**

Beginning at **583 BC**, the year the continual sacrifice ceased, we add the 1,315.75 years:

Adjusting for the absence of a year zero, the prophetic count lands in:

732.75 AD

The fractional remainder, .75 of a year:

This places the fulfillment in **early October of 732 AD.**

Daniel's prophecy does not merely reach the year - it reaches the **very month.**

Historical Alignment: October 732 AD

In **October 732 AD**, a decisive turning point occurred in Europe. Historians have long recognized this moment as one of the most consequential in Western history.

- John H. Haaren wrote: *"The Battle of Tours... decided that Christians, and not Moslems, should be the ruling power in Europe."*
- John Bagnell Bury observed: *"The penetration of Islam into Europe was finally brought to a standstill."*
- Huston Smith concluded: *"But for their defeat by Charles Martel... the entire Western world might today be Muslim."*

This moment preserved the survival of Christianity in Europe. It was, in every sense, a **blessing** to those who lived to see it.

Daniel's words echo across the centuries:

"Blessed is he who waits and reaches to the 1,335 days." (Daniel 12:12)

Those who fled after **688 AD**, enduring hardship, winter, and upheaval, would have lived to witness this turning point. The prophetic timeline aligns with precision:

- **583 BC** — the continual sacrifice removed
- **688 AD** — the abomination set up
- **732 AD** — the blessing at the 1,335th year, converted to 1,315.75

The math is exact: 583BC + 1315.75 is October 732AD

Additional Scripture and Interpretive Notes

Revelation 11:2

“But exclude the outer court; do not measure it, because it has been given to the Gentiles. They will trample on the holy city for forty-two months.”

Many recall 1967 as the year Israel reclaimed Jerusalem, the holy city long under Gentile, specifically Muslim, control.

That moment marked what many believe to be the end of “*the times of the Gentiles*” spoken by Jesus in Luke 21:24. Between the rebirth of Israel in 1948 and the liberation of Jerusalem in 1967, Daniel’s vision begins to stir. The veil lifts. The message is unsealed.

Calculating the Forty-Two Months

To interpret the forty-two months symbolically, we trace backward from 1967 using biblical year-length agreements:

- A solar month = 365.24 days ($365.24 \div 12$)
- 42 months \times 30.437 = 1278.354 days
- 1967 – 1278.354 = 688.646 AD

Once again, the timeline lands on 688 AD, an expected year for the Dome of the Rock being built on the Temple Mount. A shrine believed by many to occupy the outer court “*given to the Gentiles.*”

This is not coincidence. It is convergence.

The Abomination That Causes Desolation

The command to “*leave out*” and “*measure not*” the outer court reflects divine intention. It was given to the Gentiles. Many Christian interpreters connect this with the construction of the Dome on what is considered a wing of the temple, fulfilling:

Daniel 9:27 (NIV): “...*On a wing of the temple he will set up an abomination that causes desolation, until the end that is decreed is poured out on him.*”

Who is “he”? The spirit of antichrist. The adversary, Satan. The one who denies the Son.

Architectural analysis reveals the Dome resting on the very area called the temple’s wing, which also is the Court of the Gentiles. For many theologians, this is no accident. It is a desecration.

A Clash of Theology: A 1,300-Year Desecration

For over thirteen centuries, Islamic doctrine has proclaimed from the Temple Mount: “God forbid that He should have a son.”

This is not mere disagreement. It is a direct challenge to the Sonship of Jesus Christ. A blasphemy on holy ground.

Isaiah’s Prophecy: Foretelling the Intrusion

Isaiah 14:13 (circa 700 BC): “...*I will exalt my throne above the stars of God; I will sit also upon the mount of the congregation...*”

The “*mount of the congregation*” is widely understood to be the Temple Mount. Isaiah speaks of a false throne lifted against God, a prophetic glimpse into Islam’s future claims over sacred Jewish-Christian territory. This was spoken nearly 1,400 years before Muhammad was born.

SECTION VI - WHY THE CONVERGENCE MATTERS

The Framework Holds Together

When different prophetic timelines all land on the same point in history, a wise man does not shrug and move on. He stops. He looks. He lets the weight of it settle.
